Progress is now being made in compiling a booklet of the poems and verses that Grandmother Smith has written during her colorful life. The major part of these are rhymes written for members of the immediate family, for friends, for special occasions, and some are true masterpieces that may some day become recognized. You who know her and especially those for whom the verses were written have expressed a desire to own a collection of her writings.

We (Ethel Randall, a daughter and Melvin Frost, a grandson) have assumed the responsibility to edit the booklet. We estimate the price to be from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per copy. The compilation and organization is near completion, but your suggestions will be appreciated and considered. We must know now who wants the booklets and how many. Better still, would be your money to reserve a copy or your contribution to help pay for the expenses necessary for the completion of the project. This is a non-profit venture.

The booklet will include approximately 110 printed pages 5 1/2" by 8 1/2" with a hardboard back, stapled and with a printed title on the front. The printing will be done by cutting stencils and mimeographing the sheets. Several pictures are also being considered.
