Upon reaching Salt Lake City on June 9th we were saddened by the news of the death of our beloved brother and kinsman Hyrum Broadbent.

Hyrum Broadbent was born in Wellsville, Cache County, Utah Jan. 8, 1875. His early childhood and youth were spent in Utah and when he was 18 years of age the family moved to Southern Alberta Canada.

In 1905 he filled a mission to the Samoan Islands. It was there that he acquired the quiet, deep and unmovable testimony of the Gospel of Jesus Christ which so characterized his life. He spent three and one half years on this mission.

It was while on her mission in the Northern States in Minnepeg Canada that our sister Lorana met this fine young man. In 1916 he went over seas with the Canadian forces. While in France he was wounded several times and sustained a severe injury which impaired his body so that for the remainder of his earth life he was never entirely without pain.

After the Armistice was signed he returned to his home and then to claim his sweetheart who was waiting for him in Snowflake.

They were married May 1919 in the Temple in Salt Lake City. Five children blessed this union. Surely "By their fruits ye shall know them" has been verified in this case for their fine and brilliant sons and daughters attest to the true worth of this good couple. Acquiring an education and devotion to duty has been paramount in their lives from the beginning, motivated by a strong faith and testimony of the Latter Day work and a true love of God and a burning desire to keep all of his commandments.

And then Snowflake Stake Patriarch was the crowning achievement of his worthy life.

For a number of years this good couple have spent their winters in Mesa doing work in the Temple for their kindred dead.

I started this letter last night while at my desk in the power house and I have tried to finish anything that I start, so here goes if you find anything in this letter that may be of int rest to you or the other people of the Kinsman you may use it if not just discard it and forget that you ever received it.

I have been thinking for some time that I would like to drop a line to the Kinsman, but it seems like I have so many things that are pressing that I cant get started. Tonight while sitting here at my desk in the power house I have relaxed a moment and my mind has been going back over the years that I lived in Snowflake and although I have kept a daily journal since I was a lad I hardly think anyone would be very much interested in it except myself. I guess most of you know that I am living here in Salt Lake City and my work is in the power house of the L.D.S. Hospital, I think I could write a book on my work but as time and space will not permit will just say that we have some of the best and largest test equipment in the nation.

While we have lived in S.L.C. I have been able to go to the Temple in the past year and do work for over 50 people who have passed on. I was very happy to go to the Temple on June 15th with my youngest son Henry Ray (he is my youngest son and baby boy and rather a big baby at that as he is six feet three and weighs around 180 lbs) although he went back East to Pekin Ill. to get married a year ago they were not able to have their temple work done at that time and now he was able to get a week off from his work so he and his bride came back here and I feel very proud about this as it completes the circle except one daughter of all of them being married in the temple and my daughter has been on a mission so my five children have all had the pre privilege of going through the House of The Lord.
