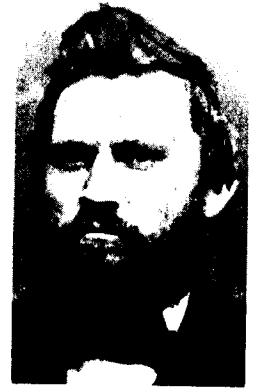

## Honors Planned for Snowflake Homes

The formal presentation of certificates in the National Register of Historic Sites will mark special observances July 21 and 22 for two pioneer homes in Snowflake, Ariz. --the William J. Flake home and the Jesse N. Smith home designated as the Pioneer Memorial Home.

Participating groups in the observance will be the Snowflake community, the Snowflake Historical Society, Daughters of Utah Pioneers, and the Smith and Flake families. Representatives for the Jesse N. Smith family will be LeRoy S. Smith (Jesse M., Joseph W.) and Bess R. Ericksen (Leonora, Joseph W.).

FAMILY OFFICERS REVIEW ACTIVITIES, PLANS

Family Home Evening Feature: HOW TWO YOUNG LOVES BECAME ONE

Editor's Note: The following dramatic sketch was written and presented for the reunion of the Northwest Regional Branch of the Jesse N. Smith Family Assn. held in Portland, Ore., April 29, 1972. The script is published here for possible use at other family reunions or by individual families desiring to review interesting events of family heritage as a Home Evening program.

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Setting: The Jesse N. Smith Pioneer home in Parowan, Utah Territory.

The Time: The 1860s or 1870s. (This could vary according to the individual children named in the cast of characters.)

The Characters: Grandma West (Margaret Cooper West, mother of Emma S. West)  
 Children--Any two or more of the children of Emma and Jesse N. Smith.  
 (In the Portland presentation with a setting of 1875, for example, the children represented Jesse N. Jr., 14; Sarah Elizabeth, 9; and John Walter, 4.)

Characters in Flashback Scenes (Spring, 1852):

George A. Smith, about 40, cousin of Jesse N. Smith

Emma Seraphine West, 16

Mary Aikens Smith, 54, widowed mother of Jesse N. Smith

Jesse N. Smith, 17, youngest son of Mary Aikens and Silas Smith

---

1st Child: Tell us a story, Grandma West.

2nd Child: Yes, please tell us about the olden days!

3rd Child: Oh, tell us about when Mother and Father were young and how they got married!

Grandma: My, my! Yes, that is quite a story. You know, your father came very close to not being your father, if one could put it that way. Anyhow, it all happened like this . . . (Children gather closer.)

Your mother, Emma, was a beautiful young girl with long, shining hair. She was 16 in that winter of 1852 when your father started seeing her. They liked each other very much, but I didn't realize just how much until two other very good men asked for Emma and her sister, your Aunt Susan, to be their wives.

2nd Child: Who were they, Grandma?

Grandma: They were George A. Smith and his brother John L. Smith. They were cousins of Jesse, and were both quite a bit older than the girls, but the family considered it a great honor to have their daughters become the wives of such important men. Now, George A. was an apostle, and it mattered little that he wore a wig and had false teeth, so Susan was very happy, and her husband-to-be was entirely satisfactory to her. But Emma, on the other hand, was distressed. Oh, she did feel a little superior, because John wore no wig, nor did he have any false teeth, and he was the most important man in the St. George district. And also his wife Augusta had given her consent for him to marry Emma.

1st Child: What happened then, Grandma?

Grandma: Well, even these virtues did not add up to give Emma real happiness. Indecision darkened her mind. Yet--when the final arrangements for the marriage were to be made--she said she would go to St. George as the wife of John L. Smith. But now, then, shortly after that, George A. was visiting in Parowan, and although Emma tried, she was just not able to conceal her sadness. One day, I remember, he came to our house to see her.

---

1st FLASHBACK:

George A.: Emma, you have said that you would become my brother's wife, yet I feel you are not entirely happy. Is there something troubling you?

Emma: I am very honored that John L. wants me as his wife--he is such a fine man. But . . . I do not love him. There is a young man here in Parowan that I do love, but he as yet has never even thought of marriage.

---

Grandma: Well, now, children, I was aware of my daughter's uneasiness, and even though I really did want her to marry John L., her happiness meant more to me than anything. So, I went to see my good friend, Sister Mary Aikens Smith, who is now your other Grandmother. I told her of the situation.

---

2nd FLASHBACK:

Sis. Smith: Yes, Sister West, I know that my son Jesse likes your daughter Emma very much. In fact, he has a decided preference for her, and they would be superbly mated. I hate to meddle in my son's life, but this is definitely an urgent case. I'll try to think of something.

---

Grandma: And so, that evening when young Jesse came home, his mother was waiting for him.

---

3rd FLASHBACK:

Sis. Smith: Jesse, how well do you like Emma West?

Jesse N.: I like her very much, Mother. In fact, I love her.

Sis. Smith: Well, Son, you had better hurry and let her know how you feel before it is too late for her to do anything about it.

---

Grandma: Now acting quickly, Jesse made a hurried visit to see Emma.

---

4th FLASHBACK:

Jesse N.: Dear Emma, I hope I am not too late in expressing my feelings for you. I love you and want you for my wife. Will you marry me?

Emma: Oh, yes indeed, Jesse!

---

Grandma: And so it was that Jesse N. Smith and Emma Seraphine West were sealed in marriage by George A. Smith on May 13, 1852. It was the very time that had been set for Emma's marriage to John L. But George A., who knew the whole

Grandma: story and had advised this youthful marriage, had promised to make things  
(cont.) right with his brother. So that, dear children, is how your mother and  
father were married. Now, what do you say about going and getting some  
cookies?

Children: Oh, yes, Grandma!

DEATH TAKES KINSMAN, MAYOR OF CLARKSTON, IDAHO

Lyle Gordon Smith, husband of Maurine Luke Smith (d. Emma, Silas D.) died at the end of March in Clarkston, Wash. at the age of 62. Funeral services were held April 3. He was district sales manager for Ralston-Purina Co. in the tri-state area of the Northwest. In 1968 he was elected councilman for the city of Clarkston and in November 1971 was elected to a four-year term as mayor.

Lyle was born 18 Oct. 1909, and moved to Idaho when seven years old. He married June Maurine Luke at Twin Falls on July 20, 1945, and they were sealed in the Idaho Falls Temple on Aug. 5, 1952. He was baptized into the LDS Church in 1951, and served in the ward and stake Sunday Schools and as a bishop's counselor.

He is survived by his wife and four daughters and two sons: Mrs. Larry (Marlyle) Keeney, Boise; Mrs. Shelley June Weatherly, Sue Ellen and Kristin Smith, Clarkston; Cpl. VAUGHN D. BUSHMAN, 58, DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Vaughn Decker Bushman (Daphne, Seraphine) died May 22 at the hospital in Silver City, N.M. after a year's illness. Two weeks earlier he had been transferred from San Diego to Silver City for treatment of phlebitis of the leg by his former doctor there. Funeral services were held May 25 in his home ward at Duncan, Ariz., with interment at Showlow.

Vaughn was born 26 Dec. 1913 to Preston A. Bushman and Daphne Decker. He married Naomi Maycock 12 Jan. 1940. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Carol Ann. A son, David Ray, died in 1960 at the age of 19. Also surviving are six brothers and two sisters: Garland F., Mitchell S., Milton F., Louis W., John V., Preston J., Georganna Spurlock, and Mrs. Reginald (Virginia) Acheson.

J.N.S. KINSMAN PUBLISHES BOOK BY UTAH-ARIZONA PIONEER

"Mormon Migrations," Vol. 5 of the series by Joseph Fish (1840-1926) titled "Pioneers of the Southwest and Rocky Mountain Region," will be available in mid-July. Publication has been made possible by the support of J. Fish Smith of Salt Lake City, a grandson of Joseph Fish and Jesse N. Smith, who were associated together in both Utah and Arizona pioneering activities.

This is an unusual book, covering the period from the expulsion of the Mormons from Nauvoo through the early years of settlement in Utah. Although many other studies have been published about the areas included in this book, it is doubtful if any other single volume is as comprehensive in information on the period covered. Then, too, the interest of the author was centered in people even more than events, a feature that will prove valuable to descendants of the pioneers.

The book is distinctive in providing names of those who made pioneer history. It has relatively complete lists of: the Brannan Company, the Mormon Battalion, servants to officers and families accompanying the Battalion, the Mississippi Company, the pioneer band of 1847, and others who came to Utah in 1847. It contains additional names of numerous others involved in settling the western area.

As a lad of six when he left Nauvoo, Ill., Joseph Fish experienced a wide range of pioneer living. At 16 he began keeping a personal journal and, with few short lapses, continued the practice for the next 70 years. He had a sense of the historically important, and his writings reflect the reality of personal knowledge.
