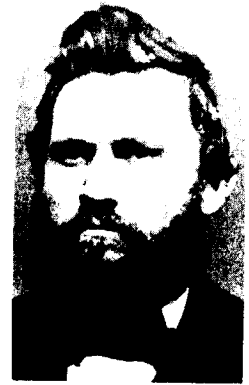

Some Memories by Natalia S. Farr

I was born in Snowflake, Arizona Territory, on April 3, 1894, just a few short years before the turn of the century. From the standards of today, I could not have meant much in my mother's already large family, of which I was the "tithing," yet I have a lingering memory of feeling very much loved and a vital part of everything.

My father was Pres. Jesse N. Smith of the Snowflake Stake. He was called to fill this position and help with the colonization of northeastern Arizona. My mother, Augusta Maria Outzen, was born in Randers, Denmark. My father married her by counsel of Pres. Brigham Young when he was set apart for his second mission to Denmark as president of the Scandinavian Mission. She was of gentle birth, yet performed well her work of rearing a family of 11 children under hard pioneering circumstances.

I grew up in a typical Latter-day Saint home in a town where the effects of worldliness had not yet penetrated. There were few vices, no saloons, few outsiders, and the leaders of the LDS Church set and controlled the standards of the growing community. On May 8, 1902 I was baptized and confirmed a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by my father. My school days were spent in the little pioneer log cabin schoolhouse where the Snowflake Theater now stands. Later we went to school in the red brick schoolhouse on the hill. After grammar school, I attended the Snowflake Stake Academy. I graduated May 8, 1916. My school days were my happy days.

I held many responsible positions in both church and school. In October 1914 I was set apart as secretary of the Snowflake Stake Y.W.M.I.A., and in April 1924 to the same position in St. Johns Stake.

On Oct. 5, 1916 I was married to David Ernest Farr in the Salt Lake Temple. Our honeymoon house was his mother's home on "the bench" in St. Johns. Our wedding trip was by train to Salt Lake City and on to California where we spent ten blissful days visiting his grandmother, Hannah H. Romney, and other relatives and friends. We spent many happy hours on the beach and eating in the swanky restaurants and attending the best movie places. One night Uncle Leo Romney and his wife Agnus took us out to do the town. It was a night to remember.

On our return home we lived in St. Johns for our first winter, and then settled in Hunt Valley where we lived six years.

Ranch life is often hard at best. We both worked long hours each day. Ernest and his brother rented the Tucker farm and raised hay and other feed. In the winter they pastured cattle. Then they rented cattle and built up a good little spread, but the old Zuni River won out. (continued on page 3)

SOME MEMORIES By Natalia S. Farr (continued from page 1)

In the spring the thirsty cattle would head for the Zuni and bog down. The men were continually fighting to save them. We would have a corral full of old, sick cows-- never less than a dozen. We fought heat, drought, flies, mosquitoes, and many other drawbacks. One morning when 27 head of cows were dead my good husband said: "Come, girl. I've had enough!" And without further hesitation we moved to town (St. Johns) and lived there until his untimely death on Jan. 17, 1939. We stayed on until we moved to Mesa in 1954. We had been happy in our home life and loved each other devotedly. We spent the years from Nov. 24, 1917 until April 14, 1936 bearing our brood of ten with two sets of twins in the deal. Norman was 19 and the babies two and a half when death took our husband and father away.

I must say that no babies were ever born that were more welcomed nor more loved, and no couple ever had more beautiful children. Of course this is the understatement of the age but it's also very mother's pride and privilege.

Two great sorrows came to us beside losing our Dad. Our beautiful little Genevieve slipped away from us on Aug. 16, 1921, aged 19 months, and our wonderful Asahel Dean was a casualty of World War II, Oct. 4, 1944. Time will never be long enough to blot out the memory of that sad day.

Four noble sons wore the uniform and did their part in the war--Dean, Ardath, Norman, and LaMarr--with Gus, Earl and Merl left to help us girls keep the home fires burning. LaMell and Sylvia were busy at school and holding jobs, doing their bit. After the war Ardath came home and met with his accident. Beaten but not defeated, he is our pride and joy.

In December, 1946 we moved into the home called the Berry place which we bought and paid for from the sale of our home on the hill and Dean's insurance. We enjoyed this good home ten years. From January, 1950 to January, 1954 I served two successive terms of office after being elected Recorder of Apache County.

We have since moved to Mesa where I enjoy my home, friends, church, and temple work. In 1970 I published a book, "Of Memory," published by my sister Myrtle Blocker and her husband John. It contains memories of my childhood in my beloved Snowflake.

My children have all married and have blessed me with 35 grandchildren, seven great grandchildren, and more expected.

MY FIRST PICTURE SHOW

Seventh child of Jesse N. and Augusta Smith

As I sit tonight . . . far from the scenes of my childhood, I see in fancy this scene: I am sitting at the old sewing machine by the north window in our home in Snowflake. Looking up, I see Father coming up the well-worn path between our house and the house where Aunt Emmy and Aunt Em live. It is early twilight, and he has just come from the Co-op Store where he had been keeping books all day. He is dressed--as usual--in a black Prince Albert coat, white shirt, black bow tie, and black hat, and is using a cane.

He comes up the steps to the back porch and gently opens the door. I can hear his firm tread through the kitchen and on into the front room. He comes over to me and smilingly says, "Where's your Ma?" Just then, Mother, hearing his voice, steps out from her bedroom and he says: "Is everything serene?" On being told that it is, he says: "Well, get your supper over with, then get the children ready and we'll all go down and see a picture show in the Stake House tonight."

My, what excitement! We snapped through our chores, one of which was to carry in armful after armful of pinewood for the five fireplaces in the house, and plenty of cedar wood for the cook stove. (When I think of that little stove now, I wonder how my dear mother ever cooked those lovely meals for that large, hungry family, besides often-times food for a guest, and at conference times food for the large crowds of visitors.)

By the time we had eaten and we were all done up in our winter wraps--Mother in her big, beautiful paisley shawl--Father came in again and we all started off down the sidewalk to Aunt Em's. We waited at the gate while Father and Asahel went in the house. The children (Caroline, Don, Lorana, Lehi, and George) came out to join us (Mother, Anna, Rachel, Sophronia, and me), then the two Aunt Emmas and Father. Then Asahel and Hyrum came with a sack of flour from the granary--that was our "ticket" to the show. We moved on down the street to Aunt Janet's and found them waiting for us at their gate (Editha, Lucy, Margaret, Ruth, Esther, Elias, and Leah). When we all got together we were a joyous crowd and quite filled the street. Father and the mothers walked sedately along, but the children frisked about like young colts in the softly falling snow. I can see the big flakes now as they light on our dark winter coats and on our dark tracks in the slightly covered ground.

As we passed by Uncle Locy Rogers' place, there stood Andrew watching us. He ran over and helped Ace and Hy with the "ticket," which was growing rather heavy by this time. When we reached the meeting house Father went in, and he and the show man laughingly counted the group as we filed into the building. I think there were 22 of us that night. Brother Johnson (I think that was the man's name) traveled by team from town to town. He had his own camping-out equipment and did his own cooking so he was glad of the flour, squashes, pork, and molasses that the townspeople paid that night to see his little show. Ours was a 50 lb. sack of flour, but in those days flour was so cheap that I believe that Father had to go down in his pockets for some more money to get us all in.

On the "stand," elevated above us, was a wooden frame covered over with a white cloth or canvas. The show consisted of pictures taken from scenes of Church history such as the homes of Brigham Young and Heber C. Kimball, Carthage Jail, and different views of Salt Lake City, etc. After we had gazed at each object or picture for a while, it would slide off the side and another would appear. And that was our first "movie" in Snowflake.

DOROTHY WELLS FROST, 69, DIES IN ARIZONA

Dorothy W. Frost, wife of Jesse A. Frost (eldest son of Editha Smith and James Harrison Frost), died Dec. 31, 1972 in Winslow Memorial Hospital of a heart ailment. Funeral services were held Jan. 3 at the Winslow 2nd LDS Ward chapel, with Bishop Joel McHood officiating. Burial was in the Desert View cemetery in Winslow.

Dorothy was born in Michigan, June 9, 1903. She married Jesse A. Frost July 16, 1929, and they spent the major part of their married life in Snowflake. They reared eight children there, including one set of twins. Her husband was employed by the Santa Fe Railroad, and they moved to Winslow 18 years ago, residing at 212 Winslow Ave.

She is survived by her husband and eight sons and daughters: Mrs. L. Elton (Madalyn) Faler, Jackson Wyo.; Bruce W., Orange, Calif.; Druce W., El Cajon, Calif.; Mrs. Eulis (Dorothy Alda) Chavis, White River, Ariz.; Mrs. Donald H. (Marylouise) Sullivan, Seymour, Ind.; Mrs. Lester E. (Madge) Hope, Idaho Falls, Idaho; Robert D., Chula Vista, Calif.; and Mrs. Steven Joseph (Sharon) Maynerich, Gallup, N.M.; 35 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. We extend our sympathy to the bereaved family members.

MORE NEWS ON THE WEST FAMILY GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

All descendants of Jesse N. Smith's first two wives (Emma Seraphine and Margaret Fletcher West), will be interested in the progress of the West family research. I recently received a report from a very fine genealogy researcher in England and he has extended our West line back five generations. In fact, he overcame a roadblock which we have never been able to overcome before! This report is so exciting--it consists of ten pages in addition to the two pages of pedigrees. Much temple work will be possible from this report. It has cost \$300, and we are most anxious that all members of the West family have opportunity to share in the expense and in the results of these reports, and to help in the expense of future research.

A copy of this report was sent to one of my West cousins--Jack H. West Jr. I have not met him personally, but he had worked on this West problem in England some 20 or 25 years ago, and after receiving a copy of the report he called me by long distance and spoke for 30 minutes or so and said that this was the greatest break-through that our West family had ever had. Needless to say, I agree with him and am hopeful that many West descendants who planned to send contributions will now have an incentive to do so. For each contribution, a pedigree and family group sheets of our direct line will be returned to the contributor.

Jack and I hoped that not only could we raise enough money to have a \$300 report each year from England, but also that we could hire a good researcher to work on our Southern States lines that we don't have too much information about. With such a large West family, if each gave a few dollars each year, we could accomplish so much in locating our direct ancestors--even in the Southern States. Editor's Note: At the present time there are about 2,750 members of the Jesse N. Smith family--about half of our total number--who are descendants of Emma and Margaret West. We commend their participation in the West Family research!

NEW PUBLICATION SCHEDULE ADOPTED FOR 1973

At a meeting in Provo on Dec. 28, officers of the Jesse N. Smith Family Association adopted a new publication schedule which will make The Kinsman a quarterly periodical in 1973. Along with the change of frequency the paper will also be modified from corner-stapled sheets to a magazine-type format, making it more attractive in appearance and more suitable for preservation.

The action came after a number of discussions on the matter following recommendations several years ago by the Utah Genealogical Society that family publications adopt a quarterly schedule for issuance. In the annual meeting of the family association in Mesa in November, 1971, approval was given for following this recommendation, and accordingly The Kinsman was reduced from 12 to six issues in 1972. Implementing the change will be completed in 1973.

Efforts will be made to increase the number of pages so that the total volume of material furnished during a year will not be reduced. At the same time, attention will be given to the retention of a type-face which is sufficiently large and clear to facilitate easy reading. The end result of the changes should provide a more professional-appearing publication which the officers hope will meet the approval of the family members it is intended to serve. They will endeavor also to widen this service by increasing the number of family units to whom The Kinsman will be circulated.

MORE KINSMEN ELECTED TO PUBLIC OFFICES

In addition to those reported in our last issue, two more active members of the Jesse N. Smith Family Assn. were chosen by their constituents to take office beginning in 1973. We salute both of them for their public service.

Harold H. Smith, former president of the Association, was elected to a four-year term as a commissioner for Wasatch County, Utah. He lives at Heber City.

Dorothy Larson Brown (Margaret, Joseph W.) of Phoenix was elected to the board of the Balsz School District. A mother of four, she is a teacher in another school district in the area.

NEW HISTORY BOOK AUTHORED BY S. GEORGE ELLSWORTH

Utah's Heritage, just adopted for textbook use in the Utah schools, has been authored by Dr. S. George Ellsworth (h. Maria, Asahel), prominent western historian and educator. Called "the most thorough synthesis of Utah's history yet written," it traces the region's development from the prehistory of the Anasazi Indians to the urbanization era of the 1970s.

While it is written to be read as a story, Utah's Heritage is organized to be used as a resource book for finding answers to questions. Its 512 pages include over 550 historic photographs of the places and events described, along with maps, drawings, and paintings by noted Utah artists. Dr. Ellsworth is professor of history at Utah State University, and was assisted in the volume's compilation by his wife. They live at 496 N. 3rd East, Logan 84321. George is editor of Western Historical Quarterly, and last year was co-author of another volume, Latter-day Saint Beginnings: Historical Accounts 1830-39.
